Meaning of the flag: Prince Edward Island's flag was granted royal warrant of King Edward VII in 1905 and was officially assented to in 1964 by an act of the legislature. The flag is modelled after the coat of arms in rectangular shape and is bordered on the three sides away from the flagpole by alternate bands of red and white

Meaning of the flag: Approval to use the Royal Union Flag in the design of Manitoba's provincial flag was given by Queen Elizabeth II in 1965. The flag closely resembles the Canadian Red Ensign. The Royal Union Flag occupies the upper quarter on the flagpole side, while the provincial shield is centred on the fly half of the flag.

Meaning of the flag: After receiving royal warrant from King George V in 1929, the flag of Nova Scotia was the first flag in the overseas Commonwealth to be authorized by royal charter. Derived from the ancient arms granted in 1625, the flag features the province's shield extended in a rectangular shape.

Meaning of the flag: The flag of Nunavut was granted by the Right Honourable Roméo LeBlanc, Governor General of Canada, on April 1, 1999. It features the colours white, blue and gold, which symbolize the riches of the land, sea and sky. Red is a reference to Canada. The inuksuk and the Niqirtsituk star are also found on the coat of arms.

Meaning of the flag: Adopted by the Legislature in 1965, with Queen Elizabeth II approving the use of the Royal Union Flag (Union Jack) within the flag design the same year. The flag was raised on May 21, 1965. Ontario's flag closely resembles the Canadian Red Ensign. The Royal Union Flag occupies the upper quarter near the flagpole, while the shield of arms of Ontario is centred in the fly half of the flag.

Meaning of the flag: Adopted by Order of the Lieutenant Governor in Council in 1948 and confirmed by the province's legislature in 1950. The flag's proportions are three by length and two by width. The flag of Quebec is often called the "Fleurdélisé". The white cross on a blue field recalls an ancient French military banner, and the four fleurs-de-lis are symbolic of France.

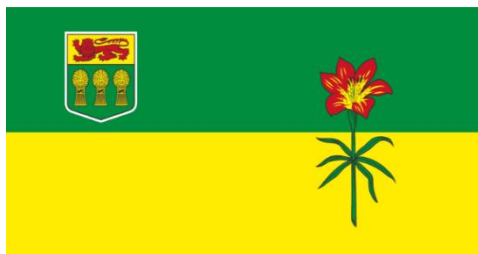

Meaning of the flag: Adopted by the province's legislative assembly and proclaimed by the lieutenant governor in 1969. The flag is divided horizontally into two equal parts – one green, one gold. The green represents the northern forests of the province and the gold symbolizes the southern grain fields. The Saskatchewan shield of arms is in the upper left quarter of the flag near the flagpole. The provincial floral emblem, the western red lily, is positioned on the fly half of the flag. The flag is based on a design by Anthony Drake, whose submission was chosen in a provincial design competition.

Meaning of the flag: Newfoundland and Labrador's flag, designed by artist Christopher Pratt, was adopted by the provincial legislature in 1980. Its white area symbolizes snow and ice; blue, the sea; red, human effort; and gold, confidence in the future. The image of the trident (three-pronged spear) on the left side of the flag emphasizes the province's dependence on fishing and the sea. The two red triangles on the right stand for the mainland and island parts of the province, and the golden arrow represents hope for the future. When the flag is hung as a banner, the arrow assumes the aspect of a sword, a reminder of the sacrifices made in war.

Meaning of the flag: The flag of the Northwest Territories was adopted by the territorial council in 1969 following a nationwide design competition won by Robert Bessant of Margaret, Manitoba. The blue panels at either end of the flag represent the lakes and waters of the Territories. The white centre panel symbolizes the ice and snow of the North and contains the shield of the territorial coat of arms

Meaning of the flag: Adopted by the Territorial Council in 1967. The flag is made up of three vertical panels. The green panel on the flagpole side symbolizes the forests, the white in the centre, the snow, and the deep blue on the fly side, Yukon's rivers and lakes. The centre panel features the territorial coat of arms and floral emblem, the fireweed. The flag was designed by Lynn Lambert, a student from Haines Junction, Yukon, who won the territorial design competition during Canada's centennial year.
